TOWN MEETING GLOSSARY

CHERRY SHEET

A financial statement from the State that itemizes State

aid and assessments to the Town.

ENTERPRISE FUND

A fund where expenditures are restricted for operating, capital and debt costs of a particular service (such as water and trash). It allows a community to recover the total costs of a service through user fees or the user fees may be supplemented by taxation. The budget for an enterprise fund is not autonomous, it must be voted annually at Town Meeting. An enterprise fund balance can be carried over from year to year.

FISCAL YEAR

The Town operates on a fiscal year that begins on July

1 and ends on June 30.

FREE CASH

Funds certified by the state as appropriated in previous years but not expended. It can result from higher than anticipated revenue receipts and/or lower than

anticipated expenditures.

OVERLAY RESERVE

A Board of Assessors fund used to cover tax abatements and statutory exemptions.

RESERVE FUND

A Finance Committee fund used for extraordinary and unforeseen expenditures during the year.

REVOLVING FUND

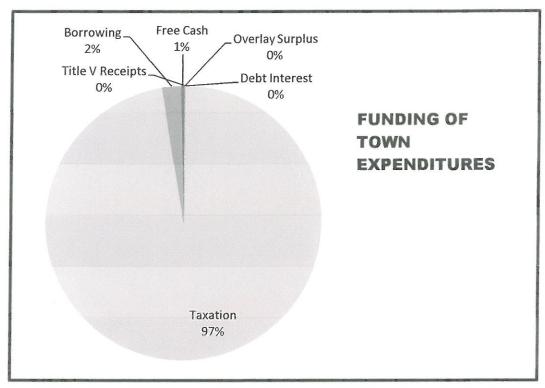
A fund created to allow specific programs to use fees collected to defray the expenses of the program. A revolving fund does not have to be appropriated each year. However, the fund does have to be reauthorized annually at Town Meeting.

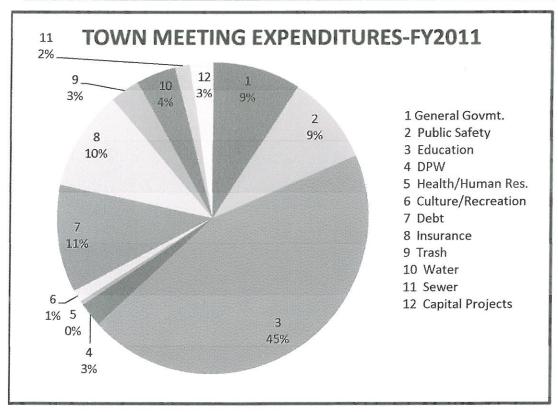
STABILIZATION FUND

Establishes source for funding future capital projects or other lawful spending. A withdrawal from the Stabilization Fund requires a 2/3 vote from Town Meeting.

TAX STABILIZATION FUND

A fund established by the voters of the town of Bellingham to mitigate the future loss of revenue from the power plants; this fund will ensure that the town of Bellingham can continue to provide services to its citizens and maintain its' infrastructure in a responsible and prudent manner.

To allow the **Bellingham Police Department** to create a special revolving fund from revenues received from **third party vendors hired by the Police Department**, details with assigned vehicles for the detail; and to authorize the Department to use funds for the repair, replacement and/or for the purchase of equipment or vehicles for the Police Department, **not to exceed \$40,000**; or act or do anything in relation thereto.
- 6. To allow the **Bellingham Conservation Commission** to create a special revolving fund from revenues received by applicants under the Town's local **wetlands protection by-law**; **not to exceed \$5,000**; and to authorize the Commission to use said funds for potential land purchases, in supplementation of funds in the Town's Land Acquisition Trust; or act or do anything in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13. APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS-SEWAGE DISPOSAL SYSTEMS, FUEL STORAGE TANKS & DELEADING DWELLINGS

To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of up to \$300,000 of monies for the purpose of remediating failing residential subsurface sewage disposal systems, underground fuel storage tanks and deleading dwellings with dangerous levels of lead, pursuant to Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 111, Section 127B ½ and Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 80 (Betterments) and to determine how such appropriation should be raised whether by taxation, transfer of available funds, borrowing or otherwise and if by borrowing, to authorize the issuance of bonds or notes by the Town at one time or from time to time; or act or do anything in relation thereto. (By: Board of Health)

RECOMMENDED by the Finance Committee. Funding: \$300,000 from borrowing.

<u>FinCom commentary:</u> This Article allows the Town to offer a loan to homeowners in order to repair their residential failing septic system through the Department of Environmental Protection ("DEP") Revolving Fund. This is only for existing septic systems. A homeowner with a problem can apply for the loan and if approved, will need to pay it back at 2% interest. The charges are placed as a lien (same as a betterment) on the property. The homeowner can pay-off the loan over 20 years.

ARTICLE 14. RESTAURANT ALL ALCOHOL LICENSE

To see if the Town will vote to direct the Board of Selectmen to petition the Legislature to enact legislation granting the Board of Selectmen the authority to issue an additional All Alcoholic Restaurant License for Gary A. Jolicoeur, for the property located at 28 Wrentham Road, Bellingham, Massachusetts.

Notwithstanding any General or Special law, or any rule or regulation to the contrary, the local alcohol licensing authority shall not approve the transfer of said license to any other location. Said license may be re-issued by the local alcohol licensing authority at the same location if an applicant for said license files with said authority a letter in writing with said authority and proves that any and all applicable taxes have been paid.

If the license granted under this section is cancelled, revoked or no longer in use, such license shall be returned physically, with all of the legal rights, privileges and restrictions pertaining thereto, to the local alcohol licensing authority. Notwithstanding Section 17 of Chapter 138 of the General Laws, or any other general or special law to the contrary, the local alcohol licensing authority may then grant the license to a new applicant at the same location and under the same conditions specified in the preceding paragraph, or act of do anything in relation thereto.

Mr. Jolicoeur owns the property, renovations have started and he will be seeking a tenant. Having the license is a "positive" for trying to find a person who wants to operate a restaurant.

ARTICLE 15. ZONING AMENDMENT

To see if the Town will vote to extend the existing Business 2 Zoning District into the existing Suburban Zoning District along the southerly side of Pulaski Boulevard in a easterly direction and at a depth of 200 feet from the southerly edge of Pulaski Boulevard, for a distance to include the following parcels of land shown on Bellingham Assessors Map 88 as Parcel 22 (159 Lake Street owned by Kevin Blake and Michelle K. Robinson, Norfolk Deeds, Book 16090, Page 528); Parcel 21 (1211 Pulaski Boulevard owned by Scott & Karen Rhodes, Norfolk Deeds Book 28202, Page 42); Parcel 20A (1221 Pulaski Boulevard owned by William P. Hemstedt Jr. & Linda E. Hemstedt, Norfolk Deeds, Book 7058, Page 229); Parcel 20 (1231 Pulaski Boulevard owned by Martin L. Carl & Carlotta S. Surette, Norfolk Deeds Book 14604, Page 57); Parcel 19 (1241 Pulaski Boulevard owned by Timothy A. Pickering & Leann Matatal, Norfolk Deeds, Book 12061, Page 9); and Bellingham Assessors Map 89 as Parcel 30A (1271 Pulaski Boulevard owned by Maurice & Anne Marie Ferland, Norfolk Deeds, Book 11824, Page 724, and Book 15449, Page 210) and Parcel 30 (1281 Pulaski Boulevard owned by Marie A. Collamati, Norfolk Deeds, Book 2842, Page 21 and Book 15449, Page 217).

Said Parcels are shown on the attached Plan attached herewith and made a part hereof and to act or do anything in relation thereto.

<u>Section 3320 (g)</u> which reads "Retail Businesses, Printing Shop/Copy Center, Other Service Establishments:

One parking space per 150 square feet of gross floor area, but not fewer than three spaces per separate enterprise." **Be amended to read**:

Section 3320 (g) Retail Businesses, Printing Shop/Copy Center, Other Service Establishments:

One parking space per 150 square feet of area used by patrons plus one space for each employee on the largest shift.

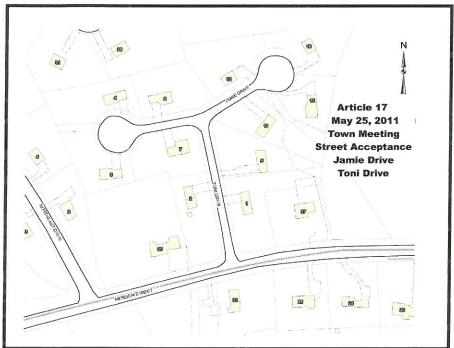

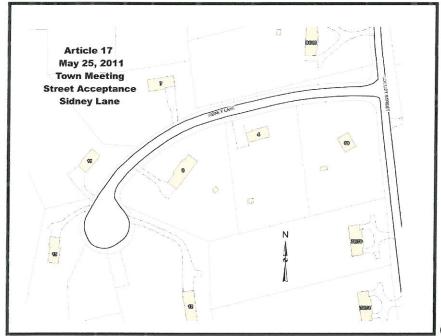

ARTICLE 18. GRANT OF EASEMENT – 2 SOUTH MAIN STREET TO 400 PULASKI BOULEVARD

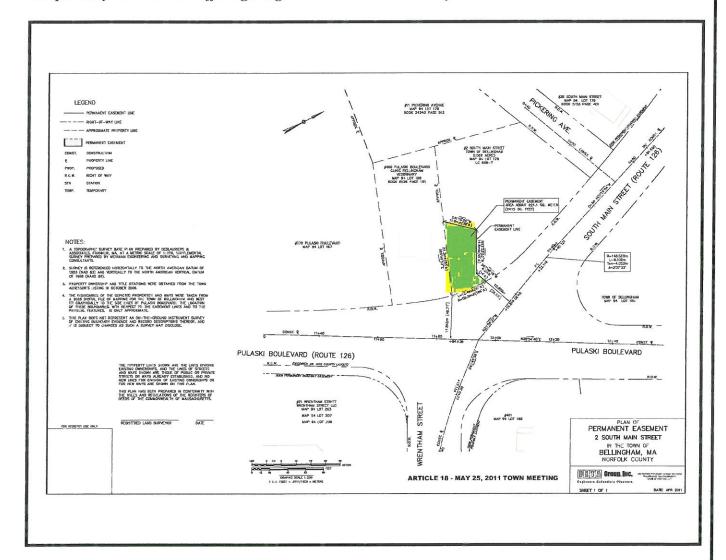
To see if the Town will vote to grant a permanent parking and egress easement on the Town owned parcel known as 2 South Main Street (the old Bank of America parcel) to the owners of

the owners of 400 Pulaski Boulevard, said easement to include five (5) parking spaces and a driveway exit as shown on the plan entitled "Bellingham Pulaski Boulevard, Sheet No. 112 of 192 total sheets Project File No. 602493 Traffic Signal Plan Pulaski Boulevard/South Main Street (Route 126)/Wrentham Road Location 1", dated Revision 11/2/2010, a copy of said plan to be on file with the Town fourteen (14) days prior to the town meeting, or act or do anything related thereto.

RECOMMENDED by the Finance Committee.

<u>FinCom commentary per Department of Public Works:</u> The easement is to allow for the modification of the Bellingham Veterinary Clinic access to parking. Once Pulaski Blvd construction was underway the property was damaged and all parking was eliminated. The Mass DOT revisited the driveway issue. It was agreed it would be safer to provide a signalized exit near the South Main Street stop line, and MassDOT agreed to fund the change order. This modified the easement needed which will now include some of the exit drive, which is on the 2 South Main St (Town owned) parcel. The appraisal for the easement is \$5,000 which the Washakowski's did not accept. They now have a traffic light signal at their "exit" driveway.



ARTICLE 19. PURCHASE OF LAND

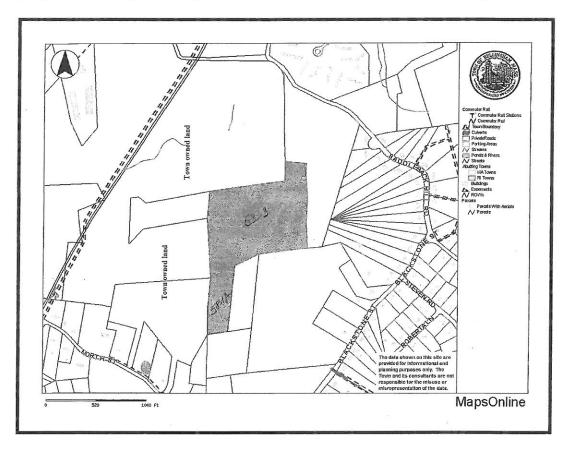
To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to purchase, or take by eminent domain title to two parcels of land, both owned by Winiker Realty Trust, one parcel containing 21 acres and the second parcel containing 3 acres and 66 rods, both being more or less, being located off the northerly side of North Street, and as described in Norfolk Deeds Book 4301, Page 635 and in Norfolk Deeds Book 7934, Page 244, and to vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money to provide payment for said purchase or eminent domain taking, and to determine how such appropriation shall be raised, whether by transfer of available funds, by taxation, by borrowing or otherwise, and if by borrowing to authorize the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds or notes of the Town therefore for the purpose of financing the purchase or taking, or act or do anything in relation thereto.

(Vote: 5 in favor not to recommend/0 against)
The Conservation Commission recommends this Article.

<u>FinCom commentary</u>: See map below: With the state of the fiscal restrains of the Town's finances, the FinCom had recommended this real estate purchase be funded with \$100,000 transferred from the Conservation Commission Land Acquisition Trust Fund (Balance in fund: \$171,000) and \$25,000 from borrowing. The Conservation Commission did not agree with that proposal, wanting \$50,000 from their Fund and \$75,000 from borrowing.



ARTICLE 20. ACCEPTANCE OF MGL CHAPTER 138, SECTION 33B

To see if the Town will vote to accept provisions of Chapter 138, Section 33B of the Mass. General Laws providing the Selectmen with the discretion to permit Section 12 (on-premise) licensees to sell alcoholic beverages between the hours of 10 AM and 12 Noon on Sundays; or act or do anything in relation thereto.

RECOMMENDED by the Finance Committee. (Vote: 6 in favor/1 against)

<u>FinCom commentary</u>: This article is being requested so that restaurants in Town can serve liquor on Sundays starting at 10:00 a.m. Some restaurants have requested this so they can offer alcoholic drinks with brunch, bridal showers, etc. See M.G.L. below:

Mass. General Law

Chapter 138: Section 33B. Sales of alcoholic beverages by on-premise licensees on Sundays and certain legal holidays; sales between 10:00 A.M. and 12:00 noon

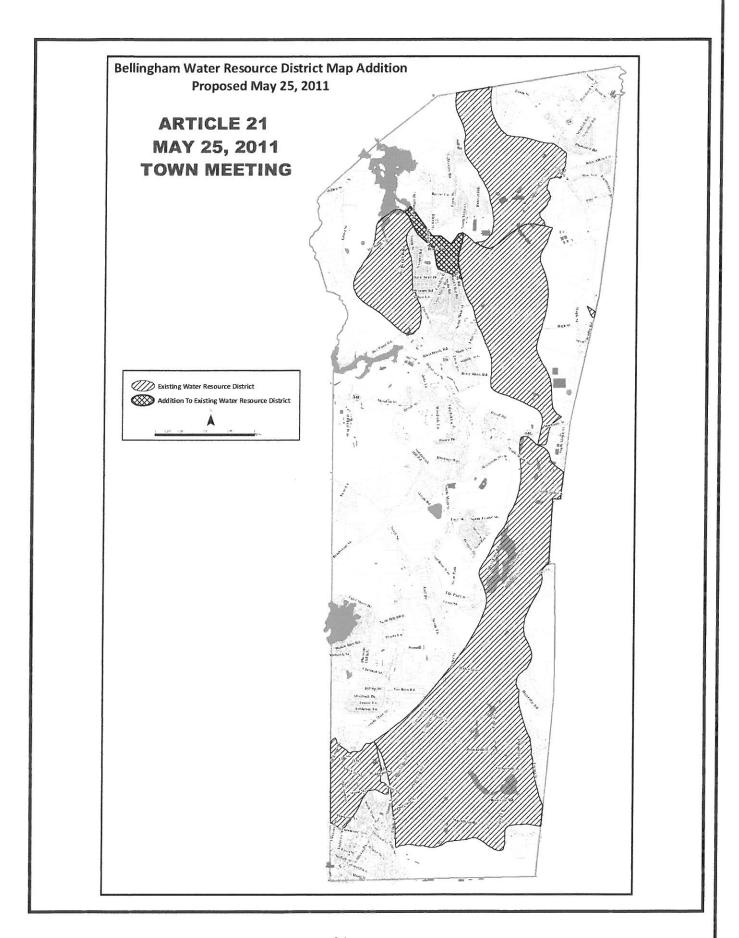
Section 33B. The local licensing authority of any city or town which accepts this section may authorize licensees under section twelve to sell alcoholic beverages between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon on Sundays, the last Monday in May and on Christmas day or on the day following when said day occurs on Sunday.

ARTICLE 21. REVISION TO TOWN ZONING BYLAW SECTION 4900 WATER RESOURCE DISTRICT MAP – EXPANDED ZONE II – WELL 12

To see if the Town will vote to amend Section 4900 Water Resource Districts of the Zoning Bylaws by, adding to the Water Resource District Map the expanded area of the Drinking Water Supply Well #12 Zone II shown on the map titled "Bellingham Water Resource District Map Addition Proposed May 25, 2011", which is on file with the Town Clerk's office, said map to be on file with the Town fourteen days prior to the town meeting, or act or do anything related thereto. (By: DPW)

RECOMMENDED by the Finance Committee. Recommended by the Conservation Commission. Recommended by the Planning Board.

<u>FinCom commentary</u>: The only change to the map is the area around Well #12, which is located at Cliff Road off of High Street. The DEP has approved this change.



ARTICLE 22. REVISION TO TOWN ZONING BYLAW SECTION 2130(b)

To see if the Town will amend Section 2130(b) of the Town's Zoning Bylaws by deleting said Section in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

(b) Lots split by district boundary line. Where a lot is transected by a zoning district boundary line, the regulations of these Zoning By-laws applicable to the lesser restricted district may, at the option of the owner, be deemed to govern in the more restricted district, up to a distance of not more than thirty (30) feet from said district boundary.

or take any other action in relation thereto.

(By: Planning Board)

RECOMMENDED by the Finance Committee. RECOMMENDED by the Planning Board.

<u>FinCom commentary</u>: It is believed that the Bylaw change means when a piece of property is zoned within two zoning districts, the owner has the option to choose what zoning district they want in order to develop or improve their property up to 30 feet from the zoning line.

Existing By-Law:

- 2130. Where a district boundary line divides any lot existing at the time such boundary line is adopted, the Zoning regulations shall apply as follows.
- (a) In the case of a use allowed in both districts, the lot shall be considered as a whole, and the dimensional regulations of the district in which the majority of the lot frontage lies shall apply to the entire lot.
- (b) In the case of a use not allowed in one of the districts in which the lot lies, but allowed in another, the lot shall be considered as if divided into separate portions by either the district boundary line or a line parallel to that line and not more than 30 feet within the less restricted district, with development of each resulting portion of the lot to meet all requirements of the district in which the majority of that portion's frontage is located (including use, lot area, frontage, and yards).

ARTICLE 23. REVISION TO TOWN ZONING BYLAW SECTION 2140

To see if the Town will amend Section 2140 of the Town's Zoning Bylaws by **deleting said** Section in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

2140. Lots Split by Town Line. When a lot in one ownership is situated in part in the Town of Bellingham and in part in an adjacent city or town, the regulations and restrictions of this Zoning By-Law shall be applied to an application for a

building permit to the extent that the proposed structure will be located in Bellingham. Land located in the adjacent city or town may be used to satisfy Bellingham's minimum lot area, frontage and yard requirements. If the structure is located in the adjacent city or town, construction shall be governed by the zoning regulations of the adjacent city or town.

or take any other action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 24. AMEND ARTICLE 2 (Trash)

To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 2 of the 2010 Annual Town Meeting by reducing, adding to, deleting, amending appropriations or transferring funds from various sources into items within Article 2; or act or do anything in relation thereto.

(By: Board of Selectmen)

The Finance Committee recommends PASSING OVER this Article.

<u>FinCom commentary</u>: There are no transfers requested at this time.

ARTICLE 25. AMEND ARTICLE 3 (Water)

To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 3 of the 2010 Annual Town Meeting by reducing, adding to, deleting, amending appropriations or transferring funds from various sources into items within Article 3; or act or do anything in relation thereto.

(By: Board of Selectmen)

The Finance Committee recommends PASSING OVER this Article.

<u>FinCom commentary</u>: There are no transfers requested at this time.

ARTICLE 26. AMEND ARTICLE 4 (Sewer)

To see if the Town will vote to amend Article 4 of the 2010 Annual Town Meeting by reducing, adding to, deleting, amending appropriations or transferring funds from various sources into items within Article 4; or act or do anything in relation thereto.

(By: Board of Selectmen)

The Finance Committee recommends PASSING OVER this Article.

ARTICLE 27. UNPAID BILLS

To see if the Town will vote to raise, appropriate or transfer a sum of money for the payment of certain unpaid bills; or act or do anything in relation thereto.
